Where's the Line?

I don't know if you realize this or not but there are committed Christians who believe that Jesus was an alien (hopefully you didn't just spill your coffee).

That's right, the "star of Bethlehem" was actually a UFO and Jesus was an alien sent by aliens to help humanity evolve. Sure he looked like a human but that is just because he was altered to look that way. His being an alien helps explain his ability to heal (advanced technology), angels (more aliens) and the resurrection (you can't kill an alien—at least not in the way you can kill a human).

As theology goes, this is, well, "way out there" to say the least! But it does raise an interesting question. When does an interpretation of Christianity stop being Christian?

Consider this: there are those whose faith would crumble completely without the notion of the virgin birth (that Mary was born of a virgin mother so as to be pure enough to give birth to Jesus). This is a foundational truth of Christianity for many people and dearly held by millions. What if it were proven to be not true?

In a less than doctrinal tradition such as ours, however, that may not be a good example. Take a bigger possibility. What if the resurrection of Jesus was proven false? That is, Jesus died on the cross and there was no Easter morning. Where would your faith be?

How many things can you take away from or add to the Christian narrative and still call it Christian? This is not a new question, mind you. Remember, in the early days of Christianity, immediately following the death and resurrection of Christ, there were committed followers of Christ who believed that he was a demi-god and not actually human at all. There were also those who felt Judas was a hero for triggering the redemptive sequence of events that lead to our reconciliation with God. Were they Christian?

Today it continues to be a relevant question. There are those who use the bible and Christian history to exclude and judge while others use it to include and welcome. Are they both right? Where is the line?
